EXECUTIVE MESSAGE

Compiling the New Relationship Trust
Foundation's annual Scholarship and Bursary
report is one of the most gratifying exercises we
undertake each year. As we sift through some 150+
bios and read dozens of comments submitted by
the students, it is heartening to learn just how
profoundly this initiative is changing the lives of so
many First Nations people in BC.

Some of the students we hear from are young and away from home for the first time; they are excited to embark on a new adventure and take the first steps toward a career of their dreams. Others are mature and often have families of their own to support; these students are pursuing a higher education to create better futures for their families and opportunities for their children. Yet despite their differences, students invariably express their deep gratitude for the receipt of an NRT Foundation bursary or scholarship award; for many, the pursuit of a higher education simply would not be possible without it.

By supporting these students in their postsecondary educational endeavours, we are not only helping individuals and their families, we are also creating stronger First Nations communities and benefiting society in BC and Canada as a whole. In fact, many students explicitly tell us how they will use their new skills and knowledge to give back to their communities; still others have aspirations of making a difference on a global scale.

In recent years, the multiple benefits of this initiative have not gone unrecognized. Since creation of the NRT Foundation as a charity, we have been able to attract additional partners. In 2012–2013 and 2013–2014, the BC First Nations Health Authority (FNHA) and the Public Service Health Authority (PSHA) contributed generously, and this year two additional sponsors came onboard: the Peace Hills Trust and CANFOR. Together, these four partners donated more than \$334,000 in 2013–2014, allowing us to distribute an additional 60 scholarship and bursary awards.

We have also been able to support additional bursaries with funds raised at NRT Foundation's annual charity Golf Tournament. A total of \$52,640 has been raised over the past three years, and we hope 2014 to be our most successful event to date. This year's tournament will be held on July 29th at the UBC Golf Club in Vancouver. We hope you'll join us for a fun-filled day in support of a great cause.

New in the 2014 scholastic year, we will make the database of past recipients available to NRT Foundation sponsors. This offering brings our education support full circle—by helping award recipients to obtain employment in their chosen fields, and by encouraging sponsors to take an active role by promoting the hiring of qualified First Nations people.

As the title of this report suggests, the NRT Foundation Scholarship and Bursary initiative is truly an investment in our future. We are extremely proud of the young people you will meet in these pages and pleased to have contributed to even a

small part of their success. We ask you to join us in wishing them the best of luck as they embark on this exciting chapter of their lives.

ABOUT THE NEW RELATIONSHIP TRUST

MISSION Investing in First Nations in British Columbia.

The New Relationship Trust (NRT) is an independent organization dedicated to strengthening First Nations in BC through capacity building.

We work to help First Nations build capacity by investing in five key capacity areas of BC First Nations governments, communities and individuals: governance, education, language & culture, youth & Elders, and economic development.

ABOUT THE NEW RELATIONSHIP TRUST FOUNDATION

MISSION To assist Aboriginal peoples in BC separately and collectively to meet their education goals, and to support the educational components of Aboriginal language retention strategies.

The New Relationship Trust Foundation (NRT Foundation) was created in 2011 to ensure that vital First Nations scholarship and bursary programs continue in perpetuity through the establishment of an endowment. The sources of the endowment will be ongoing contributions from NRT and the NRT Foundation's fundraising efforts.

The objective is to endow a minimum of \$30 million over the Foundation's first ten years of operation, while at the same time continuing the scholarship and bursary commitment to youth education.

The Foundation is overseen by a Board of three Trustees.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES

The NRT Post-Secondary Education Scholarship initiative was launched in 2007, with almost 100 awards granted at the Undergraduate, Masters and Doctorate levels in the first year. Funding for Bursaries was added in 2008, as a response to feedback we received from First Nation communities and people that there was a high demand for education in the area of Trades, Diplomas and Certificates.

In 2011, the New Relationship Trust Foundation was created and in early 2012 management of the Scholarship and Bursary Award initiative was transferred to the NRT Foundation. To date, 1,102 education grants have been awarded to students at all levels of post-secondary education. We have contributed \$5.056 million in funding to the post-secondary education of First Nation people in BC.

NEW! NRT Foundation has a database of past scholarship and bursary recipients. The individuals in the database can be contacted by the NRT Foundation to inform them about employment opportunities. This service is now available to NRT Foundation sponsors who are looking to fill positions with qualified First Nations people. 
